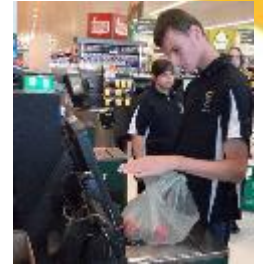

Classroom News | T1

We have had a great second term, continuing our cooking program with the T2 classroom. We have made egg-fried rice, muesli bars, macaroni cheese and home-made pasta sauce; which we served with a variety of different pasta. Students are becoming increasingly OSH aware in the kitchen, following hygiene regulations and becoming aware of the dangers around equipment, especially knives. We have been learning how to keep our fingers away from knife blades by using a bridge hold and claw grip, or using a fork to hold ingredients still while chopping and slicing. Students have also been practicing their numeracy and literacy skills in the kitchen by measuring quantities, timing dishes in the oven, following and sequencing recipes and adjusting quantities to suit fewer or more people.



We have had both an incursion and an excursion to learn about the local history of Mandurah. Katrina, the Education Officer from the Mandurah Community Museum, came into school and showed us old photographs of Mandurah, where we investigated household items from long ago. We have also visited the museum, and participated in a heritage walk around the foreshore, looking at some of our old buildings and community art works. We enjoyed visiting Christ's Church where we learned about Thomas Peel and saw the graves of people who had been ship-wrecked. We also got to ring the church bell which was lots of fun.



In Health we have been learning about gender stereotypes, healthy and unhealthy friendships, romantic relationships, and where to access help if we are worried about our own or a friend's relationship.

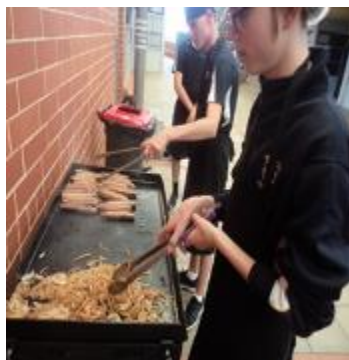

Retail has been working hard this term, with our amazing students growing in their confidence in customer service and understanding of communication in the workplace.

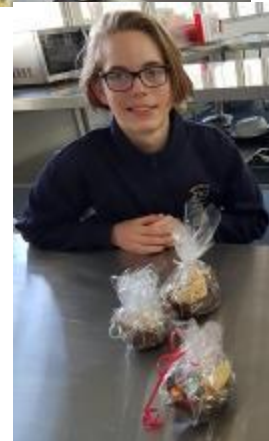
Each student has impressed staff with their commitment to providing a high standard of service during our weekly Wednesday BBQ, with a strong emphasis on team work and positive work morale.

- A reminder that student Logbooks need to go to the workplace, be completed by the student on that day and signed by the employer. Logbooks are used for in classwork so must be brought to school on Monday.
- Ensure that students arrive at work at the agreed time.
- Imperative that should the students be unable to attend the workplace they need to make a phone call to the School and the employer to let them know. At times we employ extra staff to support students in the workplace, the earlier you let us know of any absences we can manage our staff effectively.

We are looking forward to another round of successful placements with our fantastic employers who support our program and school.

It's been another busy Term, filled with many students and parents/carers meetings where we discussed goals to include in Individual Transition Plans for the year.

This term we also met with many families at Centrelink to submit Disability Support Pension applications – thank you for your patience in waiting so long with me before we managed to see someone at Centrelink. Everyone we've seen so far at Centrelink have been so helpful.

We also had meetings with families and Local Coordinators at Disability Services to ensure your child has a current National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) Plan. Effective 1st July 2018, the whole of Western Australia will roll over into the national NDIS. For those students who already have NDIS supports, your plan will be transferred over to the national system. Your child's Local Coordinator will contact you to advise you of the new changes.

For those students who are not yet connected with NDIS and don't have a NDIS Plan, the process will be slightly different. You will no longer be contacting the Mandurah or Pinjarra Disability Services Office to speak with a Local Coordinator. Instead you will be directed to contact the National NDIS helpline on 1800 800 110 or call the Midland NDIS Office on 08 9235 7200 to speak with a consultant. I am available to assist you with the new process should you require any help at all.

Breakfast Club

We have been very busy this term in the kitchen. Jayden has been working in the kitchen on Friday as part of his Work Placement. He has been a wonderful help and made the apple slice below for the Breakfast Club. (*Recipe below*)

The kitchen also supplied some of the food for camp in Week 2. We made carrot cakes, banana cakes, slice, biscuits and lasagne for all students and staff.

The apple slice is delicious served warm with custard or ice-cream.

APPLE SLICE

Ingredients

- 1 cup plain flour
- 1 cup self-raising flour
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup caster sugar
- 1 egg—whisked
- 2 cups stewed apple (or to taste)



Method

1. Pre heat oven to 190 degrees C.
2. Sift together plain flour and SR flour, then stir in sugar. Rub the butter into the flour mixture, add egg and mix to form a firm dough.
3. Move the dough to the bench and knead until it forms a smooth dough, place in fridge for 5 minutes.
4. Divide the dough into two. Roll out one then fit into a greased lamington tray. Remove and repeat with the other half but leave this one in the tray.
5. Spread stewed apply over the top, it should be about 1cm thick.
6. Top with the other half of dough. Score the top sheet of pastry into desired serving sizes.
7. Bake for 25 minutes, allow to stand in tray until cool.

ELECTRONIC DEVICE POLICY & USER AGREEMENT

Our IPS Board Members and the school community have reviewed our schools Electronic Device Policy and have decided to implement an electronic device ban. We understand that parents who, for safety, security and/or emergency purposes wish to provide their children with a mobile phone and as you will see we have allowed different alternatives such as the use of classroom/admin phones when required. Please find below the Electronic Device Policy and the User Agreement, please discuss this with your child.

There are an increasing number parents/guardians who for safety, security and/or emergency purposes wish to provide their children with mobile phones. This policy details the conditions under which mobile phones are permitted at John Tonkin College Education Support Centre.

CONDITIONS OF USE:

1. Students will only be permitted to bring a mobile phone onto school premises for safety, security or emergency purposes (ie. Contact parents after school to arrange pick-up times).
2. Mobile phones **will be required to be turned OFF during school hours of 8am—2.40pm.**
3. Mobile phones will remain in school bags AT ALL TIMES, if a student does not have a school bag the phone is to be given to admin. They may only be turned on **out of school hours.**
4. The use of mobile phones at recess and lunchtime is **PROHIBITED.** Students will be asked to put their phone away (**first warning**).
5. JTCESC has Duty of Care of all students who attend and instances that require emergency contact with parents **will be conducted by a staff member and/or Principal.**
6. The school does not accept responsibility for any theft, loss or damage of mobile phones.

Consequences of the misuse of Mobile phones at JTCESC:

FIRST WARNING: If a student is found using his/her mobile phone they will be asked to put it in their bag.

SECOND WARNING: If a student is found a second time using his/her mobile phone it will be taken to admin where the student can collect the phone at the end of the day.

THIRD WARNING: If a student is found a third time using his/her mobile phone it will be taken to admin where a parent/carer will be called to come and collect the phone.

- ◆ We are in the process of purchasing a safe for each classroom, which will enable students to keep their electronic devices safe (if required).
- ◆ Students will be able to call home from classroom or admin phones.
- ◆ Parents can call the school if they need to speak with their child.

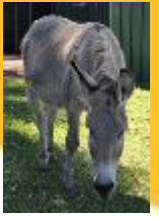
